PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The Australian Opera's production of Wagner's Ring Cycle got under way last year with a season of "Die Walkure", rather shakily and not to everyone's liking, but soon improved and more substantial in its revival early this year. In a few week's time "Das Rheingold" will have its premiere and, no doubt, its shortcomings, as this comparatively young Opera company battles to stage one of the hardest works in the repertory. Regardless of the artistic and musical standard set in these productions we have to be grateful that at last a Wagnerian regime has been instituted, and that the general public, although not yet overly enthusiastic, has finally the first hand means to become familiar with the visual presentation of the works. Records, compact discs and even video tapes have spoilt us in their presentation of near perfect performances, and it is hard to accept that stage performances - for many reasons - fall short of our ideals. Even a concert performance, where we supply our own mental imagery, seems more satisfying at times than a theatre presentation. just as the Australian Operashas taken these grand strides into Wagner's domain and committed itself to a new part of the Ring drama each year, it has recently made it known that there is to be a change in plans, and the next opera "Siegfried" will not take place in 1985. Stunned by this news, and fearful for the fate of the complete cycle, we sought some explanation. It seems that the presentation of the Ring has so strained the artistic and financial resources of the company they have called this moratorium to allow a little breathing space before a fresh onslaught can be made on "Siegfried" and "Gotterdammerung" in 1986 and 1987 respectively. The company is still seriously committed to having the full cycle ready for 1988.

We will not be left without Wagner in 1985 however, as "Die Walkure" will once again be revived in Sydney (with Leonie Rysanek) and in Melbourne (with Yvonne Minton) and "Das Rhinegold" will also be aired again for a short winter season. This will be your chance to show your support for the Australian Opera and the heroic work it is doing against great odds. The Federal Government and the Music Board are considering reducing the monetary allocation to the Opera even more, making it one of the least subsidised companies in the world. When faced with this predicament their choice to put on profitable Italian opera and commercial operetta is understandable. But let us keep our demand for Wagner opera to the fore, so there can be no further shelving of it into the "too hard" basket.

The Wagner Society Scholarship

This prize was announced last year and was to be awarded to a singer showing potential in the Wagnerian repertoire to aid in further studies. The judging panel of Sir Charles Mackerras, Mr Bruce Martin and Miss Elizabeth Fretwell, could find no suitable candidate amongst the contestants in the Metropolitan Auditions, the most suitable competition for voices in Sydney. It appeared this situation was likely to repeat itself in future years.

The Australian Opera Auditions sponsors the Bayreuth Scholarship which allows a singer, musician or stage producer to visit Germany for further training in a specific role or task demanded by the Australian Opera. After some discussion it was decided that the Wagner Society should join with the Opera Auditions in this worthy cause, and allocate its prize money to the Bayreuth Scholarship winner, but in a specific manner. The Wagner Society would undertake to provide the return air fare to Germany for the student, thus allowing them more funds for study. The Society's interests will be safe guarded to the extent that representatives from the Wagner Society will sit with the Opera Audition panel of judges.

Members are invited to contribute to the Scholarship Fund by making a donation, which when made payable to the Elizabethan Theatre Trust on the form supplied, is tax deductible.
