BAYREUTH FESTIVAL TICKETS

In the March Newsletter you were advised that, on an individual basis, applications for festival tickets would be accepted at the Bayreuth Booking Office  $\frac{ONLY}{a}$  on the standard form issued by that office. The address to write to for a ticket

application form is:-

In October you should receive your form which must then be completed and returned to the Box Office <u>before</u> the notified date - usually 14th November - to be considered in the allocation of tickets. The following advice is given to those of you who would consider attending Bayreuth next year in a group tour, and to those who are willing to apply for tickets, even if not able to attend the festival, and offer them for sale to other members.

When filling out your ticket request form it is suggested that the last Cycle of operas be applied for, which involved seven evenings if the Ring is being performed, or five single operas, occupying the last 6 to 9 days of the festival. The price group is optional, but A2, A3 and A4, are recommended for the most satisfying visual effect. The sound is excellent throughout the auditorium. The second cycle could be selected as alternative.

Sign the form, noting that immediate payment will be made for the tickets.

Please do not hesitate to telephone a committee member if you are doubtful of the procedure. The results of your application will be posted to you between the end of December to mid January if you have been successful. The December Newsletter will have a form for you to use, so that details of tickets can be collated.

#### BERNARD LEVIN

#### A WAGNER CONNECTION

The Wagner Society can now list among its members a relative of its namesake, Richard Wagner. In an interesting family tree Mr. Frank Keep of Wollongong can trace his ancestry through five generations to Carl Friedrich Wagner and his wife Johanna Rosina (nee Patz), the parents of Wilhelm Richard and - amongst others - Carl Albert. It is from this Albert - by 14 years Richard's elder brother that Mr. Keep descends, being the great-great-grandson.

The lineage has been authenticated by the Bayreuth establishment and Wolfgang Wagner, the present head of the family, has himself acknowledged the connection in a personal letter.

Mr. Keep, now 68 years of age, had suspected a link with his illustrious forebear for many years, as his mother's middle name was "Wagner"; but it is only recently the vital proof of the interesting generations was confirmed. We give Frank a warm welcome to the Society.

# **PARSIFAL**

#### A PERSONAL VIEW

Is it that Wagner is hard to comprehend, or is it that only at times when one can relate personally to the emotions and experiences of which Wagner wrote that a clear understanding of his work evolves?

Personal interaction with Wagner's operas at various moments in our own development seem to expand the understanding and give a clear insight into our own lives.

#### Parsifal Cont'd

More than any other of Wagner's operas, Parsifal comes near to being the work best described as a masterly composition of richly powerful and moving effect. A suitable final statement of attainment from the lifelong development of a man towards understanding; and an expression of that which time and experience had nurtured and matured in his being.

Chronologically his final work, the one in which his musical expertise had reached an expressive eloquence that immediately absorbs the listener; from the opening bars of the prelude, engulfing and absorbing one deeply yet gently into a world of thought and subtle questioning as the journey of Parsifal unfolds; a microscopic view of a universal experience taken by many in their search for a truth and meaning to life.

Thus, philisophically it appears to be the work that draws together the thoughts and themes from so much of Wagner's early operas and deals with them all, not individually but collectively, showing that maturity of the man and his life where the separate realities of love, passion, lust, greed, envy and hate have all been surmounted, and a deeper truth beyond the realms of everyday existence is paramount. It must be considered that work of Wagner's requiring the greatest spiritual concentration on the part of the composer.

A piece of inspired beauty; entrancing, sustaining, absorbing music that reaches immediately to the emotions, one is engulfed as the opera increases in energies, stimulating beyond sensory excitement, one reaches a point where there is nothing but Parsifal, existing in a gentle world that even the harshness of Kundry's agonising torment, the hatefullness of Kilingsor's suppression of his being can destroy that feeling of wholeness and purity. The masterly skill of Wagner's development of passion and awe cradles one in a feeling of compassionate tenderness.

The Holy Grail, itself a symbol of a state of purity and honesty, is an excellent vehicle for the expression of a philosophy that is not however necessarily a Christian one but a more universal one.
