### FRIEDELIND WAGNER (1918 - 1991)

Friedelind Wagner, grand-daughter of Richard Wagner, died on May 8 in the Ruhrland aged 73. She was born at Bayreuth in 1918.

Friedelind Wagner, the maverick among the grandchildren of the composer, virulently anti-Nazi, pro-American and often critical of what went on at Bayreuth, had been brought up in idyllic circumstances at Bayreuth, daughter of Siegfried, whom she so resembled in looks (they both inherited the great Wagner's profile). He died in 1930, the very year Toscanini went to conduct at Bayreuth. The 12-year-old Friedelind fell under his spell: "It was as if in the hour of my father's death, heaven sent me another." She grew to loathe Hitler whom her English mother Winifred adored, and spent long periods away from home, in 1939 fleeing to Lucerne to her aunts who were still resident at Triebschen, Wagner's old home. Hitler and her mother demanded that she return to Germany, making all kinds of threats against her. She defied them all and severed all links with Germany.

She produced Tristan and Isolde with her own company in 1946, the settings

by her brother, the then unknown Wieland Wagner. In 1948 she created something of a furore with her book *The Royal Family of Bayreuth* in which she told of her gradual disillusionment with the whole pre-war set-up there. Wieland invited her back to Bayreuth in 1953 when she was greeted with cries of "Die Maus", her nickname of old. In 1959 she began her master-classes there, which went on until Wieland's untimely death in 1966. She then produced a *Lohengrin* at Bielefeld.

Last March I had the pleasure of attending 3 operas at the Met - Parsifal, The Marriage of Figaro and I Puritani. I was charmed by the beauty of the Met, with its imaginative lighting. Parsifal, conducted by James Levine, was great music, wonderfully played.

Placido Domingo gave an impressive interpretation of Parsifal and sang beautifully. Having read the article "Parsifal" at the Met" in the June newsletter, I cannot agree with some of the views expressed by Donal Henahan. Jessye Norman would not physically be considered an ideal Kundry - but to my pleasure she acted the role better than I expected and sang with such a golden stream of heartfelt sound that I found her performance very satisfying. I was also impressed by Robert Lloyd as Gurnemanz, Ekkehard Wlaschiha was Amfortas, Franz Mazura as Klingsor.

The staging was conventional, functional and had a reasonably attractive

appearance, if no great mysteriousness. It also had a couple of rather good devices which helped Jessye Norman cope with the physical demands of her role. To me it more than sufficed and did not distract attention from the wonderful singing and orchestral playing.

We are sure you have some tucked away. Please pencil your name on the back of the photo(s) and hand them to a committee member on your arrival at the Goethe Institute. (Discretion and safe handling guaranteed). These will be displayed on the auditorium walls and you've guessed it - fellow members will have to spot you. # WAGNERIAN VOICE TRIUMPHS! LISA GASTEEN AT CARDIFF

Wagner lovers have a special cause for pleasure at Lisa Gasteen's victory in the 1991 "Singer of the World" contest in June. All who heard her sing Elsa for the Australian Opera in Sydney recently will have recognised a major talent emerging in the Wagnerian repertoire. Lisa's Cardiff win confirmed this. She was one of twenty-five contestants, each sponsored by his or her national radio network, competing for the major prize of 5,000 pounds sterling. The week-long contest produced five finalists, to face an adjudicating panel of seven distinguished opera authorities, including Galina Vishnevskaya and Elisabeth Soderstrom.

Besides Lisa's meritorious award, the good news is how much to the fore Wagner's music was in the final concert. The Munich bass-baritone Franz Hawlata (aged 27), sang the King's Prayer from Lohengrin and Pogner's address from Act I of Die Meistersinger - both well characterised in youthful, firm tone. The American soprano, Margaret Jane Wray, sang Elsa's Dream competently but it was left to Lisa, the last of the five singers to appear on the concert platform, to demonstrate to the audience and judges how Wagner soprano music can blaze excitingly. Lisa sang first "Dich teure Halle" and, as Humphrey Burton put in, on the TV relay, St David's Hall in Cardiff suddenly came alive with song. For her second piece, Lisa chose Sieglinde's narrative, commencing at the words "Schlaefst du, Gast?" and characterising the text very well while rendering the musical line in convincing, almost fearless, style. A most impressive performance, to be followed by her singing of "Pace, pace, mio Dio" from La Forza. This brought a most enthusiastic response from the audience and in effect sealed Lisa's triumph.

Lisa has been singing for ten years now but she has the advantage of having started her career at the somewhat late age of twenty-two. She has been able to cope with this taxing lyrico-spinto music with ease and assurance. Her teachers, Ms Elizabeth Nickson in Brisbane, and Madame Blanche Thebom in America, should be deservedly proud. The monetary prize at Cardiff is of less importance than the attention now being paid to Lisa by opera managements

around the world. We in Sydney have the chance to hear our "Singer of the World" this month, not in a Wagner role, alas, but as Donna Anna in the revival of the new production of *Don Giovanni* - performances to look forward to!

#### HOW TO GET TO BAYREUTH

Some advice and an information map..... with more to come next issue.

It's that time of year again when your plans for the 1992 pilgrimage to Bayreuth should be set in motion. Wagnerites will resort to almost anything to acquire tickets and the growing number of requests each year has produced daunting waiting lists, headaches for the Kartenburo and despair for those who wait. Some have been waiting for seven years! But there is hope. The Festspielhaus is very concerned to see that such perseverance is rewarded and is attempting to rectify the problem.

As you read this, the 1991 Festival has drawn to a close and the Box Office is preparing to receive requests for the green application forms for the 1992 Festival.

Applying to the Festspielhaus is only one avenue available. In the Information Map below, you will find the names of other possible sources, to any one, or all of which, you can apply independently.

The important thing is that you DO IT NOW!

Through whichever agent or Society you apply, the requests for the application forms must reach Bayreuth before November 1992.

It's worth remembering that for the cost of being a member of another Wagner Society (wherever in the world it is) your chances of obtaining a ticket are doubled.
